


Protagoras



A work on logic and didactics, Protagoras (380 BC) is a brief but significant dialogue written by Plato. It presents a major argument between Socrates and Protagoras, a mature and well-known Sophist. It is unique among Platos works because it involves over twenty characters. The main question is whether virtue can be taught is discussed, but homosexual love is also discussed.
