Gurdjieff is a man who would continually straddle borders—between East and West, between man and something higher than man, between the ancient teachings of esoteric schools and the modern application of those ideas in contemporary life. In many respects—from the concept of group meetings to the mysterious workings of the enneagram to his critique of humanity as existing in a state of sleep—Gurdjieff pioneered the culture of spiritual search that has taken root in the West today. While many of Gurdjieff's students—including Frank Lloyd Wright, Katharine Mansfield, and P. D. Ouspensky—are well known, few understand this figure possessed of complex writings and sometimes confounding methods.
